



## Glossary

<b>Agency</b>	a business or organization established to provide a particular service
<b>Bureau of Land Management (BLM)</b>	an agency within the United States government that administers more than 247.3 million acres of public lands mainly located in twelve western states of the United States
<b>Care</b>	providing for something in a positive way
<b>Develop</b>	to aid in growth, maturation, or expansion
<b>Economy</b>	financial system of interaction and exchange
<b>Ecosystem</b>	everything that exists in a particular environment (an ecosystem includes living things, such as humans, animals, and plants, and things that are not living, such as sunlight and water)
<b>Federal Land</b>	Lands owned by the government and managed through a federal agency
<b>Fish and Wildlife Service</b>	the United States Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS or FWS) is an agency of the federal government within the U.S. Department of the Interior dedicated to the management of fish, wildlife, and natural habitats
<b>Forest Service</b>	the United States Forest Service (USFS) is an agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture that administers the nation's 154 national forests and 20 national grasslands, which encompass 193 million acres
<b>Held in Trust</b>	principle that the governing body holds certain lands in trust for public use in some way

<b>Industry</b>	a group of businesses that provide a particular product or service
<b>Invasive</b>	growing and dispersing easily, usually to the detriment of native species and ecosystems
<b>Manage</b>	be in charge of, run, be head of, head, direct, control, preside over, lead, govern, rule, command, supervise, oversee, administer, organize, conduct, handle, guide
<b>National Park Service</b>	the National Park Service is an agency of the United States federal government that manages all national parks, many national monuments, and other conservation and historical properties with various title designations
<b>Native</b>	found originally in a place, not introduced from another place
<b>Natural Resource</b>	sources of life, materials, or energy that we are able to get naturally from the earth
<b>Noxious Weeds</b>	plant that has been introduced, accidentally or intentionally, into an environment and causes or is likely to cause environmental or economic harm; plants that have been declared by a legislative body as worthy of regulation and management
<b>Private Land</b>	land owned by a person or group and kept for their exclusive use; permission and access for any purpose must be granted by the owner
<b>Property</b>	land mass of varying size
<b>Public Land</b>	land owned by a government (may or may not be accessible to the public)
<b>Reclaim the land</b>	returning land back to its original state often with improvement
<b>Resource</b>	a place or thing that provides something useful
<b>State Parks</b>	state lands reserved to be enjoyed by the public for recreation and tourism and do not generate income through development
<b>State Trust Lands</b>	lands that were granted to Wyoming and designated to generate revenue for public schools and other state institutions
<b>Stewardship</b>	As Wyoming citizens, we are stewards entrusted with the responsible development,

	care, and use of our resources to benefit current and future generations.
<b>Sustainability</b>	the ability to be maintained, able to last for a long time
<b>Tourism</b>	the activity of traveling to a place for pleasure that can generate revenue from the enjoyment of Wyoming's land and/or resources
<b>Tourist</b>	vacationer, traveler, sightseer, visitor
<b>Use</b>	the way in which land can be interacted with based on regulations
